New adult skills research

Ireland took part in the International survey of adult skills in 2023. The results were released on 10 December 2024. In Ireland 3,820 people did the survey. The results show that unmet literacy needs remain a challenge in Ireland.

PIAAC results in 2023

In **literacy**, **21%** of adults surveyed are at level 1 or below. The OECD average is 26%. This means around 700,000 people may find it difficult to read instructions and follow them.

In **numeracy**, **25%** of adults surveyed are at level 1 or below. The OECD average is 25%. This means around 835,000 people may struggle with working out a percentage or discount.

In **adaptive problem solving**, **28%** of adults surveyed are at level 1 or below. The OECD average is 29%. This means around 935,000 people may struggle with working out how to get from A to B in the fastest time.

Literacy: Ireland is 13th out of 31 countries.

Numeracy: Ireland is 18th out of 31 countries. Adaptive problem solving: Ireland is 17th out of 31 countries.

Reference: Programme for the International Assessment of Adult Competencies (PIAAC) (2024). Organisation for Economic Co-operation and Development (OECD). The Central Statistics Office (CSO) carried out the survey in Ireland.

Updates from the ALL Office


- All 16 Regional Adult Literacy Coalitions are now set up. They are currently putting together their plans for 2025.
- A workshop on the **Literacy Ambassador Programme** was held on 10 October. There was representation from each ETB, as well as from AONTAS, NALA, and ETBI.
- The **thematic working group on Family Literacy** met at the NALA Family Literacy conference on 27 November.
- Staff from many organisations continue to take part in **Literacy Awareness** and **Plain English** training.
- The promotional campaign 'Let's talk about literacy' took place on radio and social media in September. The campaign encouraged people across all of society to get engaged with literacy. It raised awareness of services and highlighted the positive impacts it brings to all.

National Ploughing Championships

Regional Literacy Coordinators and National Programme Office staff shared a stand with NALA staff and volunteers at the National Ploughing Championship between the 17-19 September.

This was an great opportunity to promote the ALL Strategy to the public and other organisations.

Around 300 people visited the stand over three days. We gave out lots of materials and talked about returning to learning.







Cavan and Monaghan Integrating Literacy for Cavan Libraries

Ceinwen Fergus, Regional Literacy Coordinator for Cavan and Monaghan, delivered Integrating Literacy training for Cavan Library staff. This was part of their Literacy Champions project.

Staff from public libraries and Loughan House prison attended the training session, which took place in Johnstown Central Library.

Ceinwen delivered a 90-minute training session on literacy awareness and how to help people with unmet literacy needs. Ceinwen also explored the use of plain language with the participants.

Library staff will also attend online NALA webinars on plain language this autumn.

Donegal Numeracy Trails

Donegal Local Development, in collaboration with the Irish Men's Shed Association, are trying out a new project called Numeracy Trails.

Men's shed members are working with numbers to measure and build wooden leaves with a ladybird design.

Learners engrave numbers on the leaves, allowing the public to count the dots on each leaf as they walk by. Leaves will be placed in three walking trails across the country:

- Rossylongan trail in Donegal,
- a Coillte walk in Falcarragh, and
- a Coillte trail in Kilmacrennan.


